Each and every day in the U.S., two women die due to complications from pregnancy and childbirth, and two babies die every hour. The majority are **women and babies** of color and **Black women and babies are most affected**.

The U.S. is among the most dangerous developed nations in which to give birth—especially if you're Black. Black women are 3 times more likely to die from pregnancy-related causes than White women. Black babies are twice as likely to die before their first birthday.

And it's not their fault.

This isn't new. For over 400 years, Black communities have faced inequity as a result of systemic racism. From slavery to the civil rights movement and even still today, substandard living conditions, barriers to care, difficulty accessing quality nutrition and many other factors have created an unacceptable reality.

We have a health equity gap in this country.

CLOSING THE HEALTH EQUITY GAP



In 1938, March of Dimes began a fight against the pandemic of the time—polio—and won. We went on to establish Newborn Screening as standard of care, address issues related to birth defects, lead efforts to promote folic acid benefits during pregnancy, and more. Today, **building on a successful 80-year legacy** of impact and innovation, we lead the fight for the health of all moms and babies with a goal to end maternal and infant mortality.
